

This list of housing resources was initially compiled for A New Chapter – a peer led group for parents/caregivers interested in preparing for the future of their youth/adult with a lifelong disability. This group represents a diverse range of ages and exceptionalities. We share this information to assist families and selfadvocates in their housing journeys.

Developmental Services Ontario (DSO) – Funded Housing Services:

For clients eligible for DSO, the following MCCSS-funded options are available, described under Housing Supports here: <u>Funded services | DSO (dsontario.ca)</u>. Some local providers are listed below, all accessed through the DSO registry (DSO phone number is 1-888-941-1121):

- Group Homes / Group Living
 - Sunbeam Community, Parents for Community Living, KW Habilitation, Community Living Cambridge, Elmira District Community Living, Christian Horizons, and Aldaview Services
- Supported Independent Living aka S.I.L.
 - KW Habilitation, Extend-A-Family, Elmira District Community Living, Aldaview Services, Christian Horizons
- Home Sharing / Family Home / Associate Home / Lifeshare
 - Extend-A-Family, Community Living Cambridge, Christian Horizons

There are also some additional options provided locally, with funded placements accessed through DSO:

- Intentional Communities
 - KWHab's 108 Sydney Street combines KWHab clients receiving supports, and nonclients from the community – vacancies filled using Region affordable housing criterion
 - Elmira Developmental Support Corporation Snow Goose and Field of Dreams intentional communities with good neighbours built in to create community and provide
 some supports organically in exchange for affordable rent etc; some residents have SIL
 supports provided by Elmira District Community Living, but housing applications are
 directly to Elmira Developmental Support Corporation (EDSC), not through DSO; EDSC

 - PCL / Menno Homes / St. Paul's <u>New Housing Project MennoHomes</u> ten PCL clients & program space, and a diverse set of tenants chosen using the Region of Waterloo's Community Housing guidelines, and some congregational space, to create community
 - KWHab emod tiny home installed behind group home to share supports / community
- Independent Living Trial for Assessing Needs and Skills
 - Elmira District Community Living Trying It On for Size
 - Community Living Cambridge Stepping Out program



- Specialized Accommodations / Supports
 - KWHab's Complex Care Initiative specialized accommodations intended to support individuals with extremely challenging behaviours that have exceeded the capacity of their caregivers
 - Sunbeam Medically Fragile / Technologically Dependent five of their group homes support clients in this group (four include some licenced children's beds)
 - Sunbeam one specialized behaviour group home for adults
 - EDCL's Assisted Living Centre seniors, complex care, or palliative care
 - EDCL's Reid Woods individuals with greater care and medical needs

Developmental Services Ontario (DSO) – additional housing resources:

Note that the demand for DSO-eligible (MCCSS-funded) housing / housing supports is much greater than the supply funded by the ministry, therefore, families may like to explore other housing options while waiting for MCCSS-funded housing through the DSO. Also, you must be "ready, willing, and able" to move forward with housing when it becomes available, in order to be placed on the DSO housing registry. So for example you can't register at age 18, if you're planning to live with your parents until age 30. You can choose to register for MCCSS housing anywhere in Ontario, regardless of where you live, when you're ready. The ADSS and SIS assessments help determine what type and level of residential supports would be appropriate to successfully meet your housing needs.

Housing Supports not funded by DSO (supports on a fee-for-service basis)

- Supported Independent Living (S.I.L.) While their services are mostly funded through MCCSS and accessed through the DSO, Extend-A-Family is open to exploring other potential scenarios on a fee-for-service basis for those who don't qualify through DSO, but could benefit from services and have other means to cover the costs; they do already provide some services through the LHIN and some families use Passport for fee-for-service supports
- Independent Living Trial for Skill Building / Needs Assessment Community Living Cambridge's Stepping Out program is an option
- In-home service providers, often used for seniors, can also fill this gap, for example Right At Home, or Community Support Connections <u>Home Community Support Connections</u>
- free DSO housing toolkit can be used by anybody, and has a lot of helpful information even for families who don't qualify for DSO: <u>Welcome to the DSO Housing Toolkit | DSO (dsontario.ca)</u>



- Adults In Motion (AIM) * future * planning to get into residential supports respite, supported independent living, trial/assessment apartment, and various models of residential homes including possibly a staffing-your-home model – contact them to share your needs
- Lutherwood Housing Resource Centre <u>Housing (lutherwood.ca)</u> assists with housing searches and options, navigating/accessing regional housing services including affordable housing and supportive housing, rent bank, accuity assessments for PATHs list housing support workers provide support for housing specifically; accessible to anyone in the community (individuals and families); also finds tenants for landlords who offer to connect
- Lutherwood Safe Haven Life Launch for 16-17 year old clients light-touch supports to increase skills and help establish successful housing so they can manage independently as adults

Other Specialized Housing Services / Supports

- Thresholds Homes and Supports Mental Health
 - o Housing Support Services | Thresholds Homes and Supports (thresholdssupports.ca)
 - o Includes group homes, subsidized apartments, crisis respite, and supports in own home
 - Access via Adult Intensive Services through Here 24/7
- Traverse Indepence <u>Home Traverse Independence</u> -Acquired Brain Injury, Physical Disabilities
 - Services funded by Ministry of Health for ABI include Transitional Home, ABI Group
 Home, and ABI Outreach Support towards/for independent living, ongoing if needed
 - ABI Transitional Home and ABI Outreach Support also available privately-funded
 - Physical Disabilities <u>Supportive Housing Traverse Independence</u>; two supportive housing locations in Kitchener; apply through the LHIN; pay own rent and living expenses; able to direct own care; can apply for rent-geared-to-income through Kitchener Housing (for Union Lane) or through Region of Waterloo (for Strasburg Rd)
- Independent Living Centre | ILC Waterloo Region (ilcwr.org) physical disabilities
 - attendant services for people with physical disabilities who can direct their own care, in their own home wherever they live <u>https://www.ilcwr.org/attendant-services</u>
 - Assisted Living services with 24/7 on site in these communities:
 - Waterloo Shamrock Co-op <u>Assisted Living at Shamrock Housing Cooperative</u> (caredove.com)
 - Cambridge Kiwanis Village <u>Assisted Living at Kiwanis Village (caredove.com)</u>
 - Kitchener Assisted Living at Mooregate Crescent Apartments (caredove.com)
- Sunbeam Lodge <u>Home Sunbeam Lodge</u> a private service provider for medically fragile individuals, from infancy into adulthood – can be referred by an agency like FACS or DSO to set up agreement using MCCSS funding; families can also apply directly if they have insurance / means to fund the care on a fee-for-service basis; focus is on complex medical needs (not behaviour concerns, since residents are fragile); includes a classroom and an adult day program
